Reflections from Pastor Cathy ...

What does it take to become a person of character and courage and conviction? Certainly Jesus, in his earthly life, embodied these qualities, and calls us, through a life of discipleship, to embody these traits in our love for God and love for humanity.

I recently read a book of historical fiction chronicling the real life of Sarah Grimke and her younger sister Angelina, two of the earliest female abolitionists, and imagines the life of a slave girl, "Hetty Handful". The Invention of Wings, beautifully written by Sue Monk Kidd, inspired me to reflect more deeply on what issues are important enough to me to take a stand, to speak up and to risk action.

History asserts that Sarah and Angelina Emily Grimke were the first women born into a southern slave-holding family to speak publicly on behalf of the abolition of slavery. They were also among the first to see the close connection between abolitionism and women's rights. With their religious conviction, they found the courage to defy their family's beliefs and leave the comfort of home and wealth. Speaking publicly against slavery and the subordination of women quickly created controversy and death threats. They were also criticized for having the audacity to speak to "promiscuous meetings of men and women together" in the 1830's, being admonished that women should remain silent in such gatherings.

Undeterred, these women, among others, continued to speak publicly for the rights of all people, addressing people in town halls and coming before legislative committees in Congress. When the U.S. Constitution was amended to give civil rights to African Americans, the Grimke sisters continued their efforts on behalf of racial equality, and turned to the early women's rights movement, attempting to change the 15th amendment to include women.

More than a century later, this story of the courageous Grimke sisters has been largely forgotten. I am thankful to Sue Monk Kidd for bringing stories like this to the forefront, especially in this season of Lent, as we reflect more deeply about how God is calling each of us to live into the words Jesus spoke in Luke 4:18 - "*to proclaim good news to the poor, the recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed.*"

May we move forward with bold commitment and courage toward the spiritual life to which we are called.
