Pastor's Perceptions

Sand Point Community UM Church is one blessed community in Christ!!! Each week I am discovering new groups of people who love God and one another and enjoy being useful in God's mission of loving the world! What a kick! It really didn't dawn on me when I accepted this appointment that it would be so much fun.

You may or may not know that there are many churches like SPCUMC that are on the slippery slope of decline and NO ONE in those congregations will realize it until it is too late to intervene. You have been fortunate to have had two pastors follow each other who did realize this, participated in Conference-wide conversations about decline and how to address it, attended seminars, read books, listened to experts, and brought their wisdom to this faith community. Thank you to the Rev. Patricia Simpson and the Rev. Cathy Law.

This community in Christ has held its own in a time of severe decline. That is NO SMALL ACCOMPLISHMENT in this None Zone! I offer my sincere congratulations.

Do you know what the None Zone is? In 2004 *Religion and Life in the Pacific Northwest: the None Zone* was published. Here was the empirical data that explained why our part of the United States is the "least churched" area in the nation. This is the only region of the US where the majority of the people (63%) have no religious affiliation **and don't want to have one**. When asked about their religious affiliation they wrote: none. Hence, the title of the book.

I hope as you read this you say, well, how are we different from other churches in our situation in this none zone? Think of the elements that you cherish in your church. What are they? Tangible? Intangible? Have guests returned to become involved? Why? Were there baptisms in the past several years? Why? Churches in decline probably answer "no" to the last two questions.

When was the last time you invited a friend or neighbor to come to worship or to some group or special event with you? My hunch is that those of you who have been here twenty or more years ran out of neighbors years ago because they were already here with you or you knew and respected their membership somewhere else. Are there new people in your neighborhood? The Sand Point area is in the midst of changing demographics as long-time residents move out of their homes and new people move in. The fact is not true for

- **Collaborate with food banks and other anti-hunger organizations** to boost efforts to fight hunger in Seattle and King County.

For the last several months we have not actively asked for household donations because SPH has been undergoing building updating (new windows and siding) and the Resource Room was not accessible. That work is now done. The interfaith team that works in the Resource Room met with SPH staff last Wednesday evening to work out details. The good news is that the Resource Room will be open again in November to residents in transitional housing. Specific gently used items are needed at this time: blankets & sheets (twin & double), towels, mixing bowls, cereal bowls, storage containers with lids, dinner plates, drinking glasses, frying pans of all sizes and larger pots & pans with lids. (*Note: saucers, mugs & small pots are not needed.*) If you would like to donate items, you may bring them to the church office. Thank you for your support.
